VILLAGE OF AURORA GET-TOGETHER! SAVE THE DATE, SATURDAY, JULY 17, 10 AM-2 PM

Are you aware that the village is revising its comprehensive plan?

The plan is an important document that gives a snapshot of the village, what we think is important, what needs to be preserved, and what needs to be changed. It's about the physical environment as well as the cultural one, and guides the village in terms of zoning and land use decisions, as well as investments of tax funds.

We need your knowledge as well as your opinions!

The Village needs to consider everything and everybody. What's good in the Village, what's bad? What are the concerns of senior citizens? of young families? of singles? of business? of non-profits? Where do we want to be in ten or twenty years?

Come and discuss the issues important to Aurora with planning professionals!

The Village has engaged <u>Labella Associates</u>, an international firm based in Rochester, to study the village and help us understand where we are and where we might be in the future. From your comments Labella's planners will produce a detailed report on the state of the village and recommendations for future planning.

One-day workshop and open house!

The one-day workshop is being held at the firehouse in the truck bay to get input on the community overall. Tables/stations will be set up to address and discuss various Comprehensive Plan categories: commercial development, parks/open spaces, housing/neighborhoods, streets/amenities and public services. Easels with information on each category will aid in the discussions. The workshop will be "hands on" and interactive to ensure everyone's involvement. Staff from the LaBella consultant team will assist each table with information; keep them on track; and make sure all voices are heard. Each table will share a summary of the team's preliminary consensus ideas on its topic to all the workshop participants.

A Note from Your Legislator Regarding Broadband Access and Availability

Since we began the push for the first highspeed internet service over a decade ago, we have made excellent progress in our community and the surrounding areas. Availability has greatly increased, but make no mistake, we are not done. Not everyone has access to high-speed internet. Until we all do, the work must continue.

As the past year has shown us, reliable access to broadband internet is no longer a luxury. Covid-19 forced many aspects of our day-to-day lives online; virtual learning, remote work, online shopping, telemedicine, and simply staying connected with those we care about. It also laid bare how prevalent the digital divide is in our community.

To address this issue, Cayuga County has partnered with the Central New York Regional Planning and Development Board (CNY RPDB) to complete a study that will identify areas in our County that lack access to reliable broadband internet. The County will then complete a detailed plan to address the problem areas.

ECC Technologies has created a website and survey material to collect the necessary data. The survey is confidential and will be used only to identify areas in the County most in need of improved service. Please take five minutes to complete the online survey at https://www.cnyinternet.com. In addition, I encourage you to forward this link to your family, friends, and neighbors. Hard copies of the survey may be obtained by calling 315-412-5966. The more responses we receive, the better positioned Cayuga County will be to address this critical community issue in the months ahead.

More Human than Human



Good science fiction is a great way to examine the human condition. By inspiring a willing suspension of disbelief it forces us to practice empathy and accept a perceived reality.

Aurora Free Library will be looking at Philip K. Dick's 1968 science fiction novel, *Do Androids Dream of Electric Sheep?* -- the basis for Ridley Scott's 1982 film "Blade Runner" and an influential work of post-apocalyptic fiction.

The book explores the ideas of technology, artificial intelligence, the future, the real (as opposed to the artificial), the idea of design or creation, and entropy. All the while focusing on what is "reality" and what does it mean to be human and humane.

Unity House Community Service Award

Unity House of Cayuga County, Inc. is pleased to announce its annual award winners, who will be recognized at the agency's annual dinner on Wednesday, September 15 at Chantelle Marie Celebration venue in Auburn. The public is welcome to attend; details will be shared soon.

The Fred Atkins Community Service Award committee has selected **Mrs. Trudy Buxenbaum of Aurora** as its 11th annual awardee.

Unity House introduced the community-wide Atkins fund and award in 2011 in memory of beloved Cayuga County volunteer and 30-year Unity House board member Frederick Atkins. The Atkins Award recognizes an outstanding individual who volunteers in Cayuga County and who exemplifies Fred's high moral standards and philanthropic spirit.

Trudy Buxenbaum was nominated by Angela Ryan, executive director of Matthew House. Trudy grew up in southern Cayuga County, and after retiring from a 30-year teaching career at Emily Howland Elementary School in 1995, decided that volunteering was the best way to stay active and involved, and help others. Her appreciation for the work hospice does for people in their final days inspired her to provide respite care in people's homes, but the schedule was too sporadic. Eventually she came to Matthew House, which has been a perfect fit for nearly 20 years.



Over the years, Trudy has also volunteered for Poplar Ridge Instant Aid, Loaves & Fishes and King Ferry food pantries, the Alternatives to Violence program at Auburn Correctional Facility, and the Howland Stone Store Museum in Sherwood. She also helps out at Camp Gregory and the Hazard Library in Aurora, teaches ESL to migrant farm workers in the area, and is actively involved with the Anne Frank Tree Project at Southern Cayuga Central School.

At the dinner, Trudy will receive a \$500 cash prize: \$250 for her to keep and \$250 to be given to the Cayuga County non-profit of her choice. Trudy has selected Matthew House as this year's recipient to receive the full \$500 award, and will present the check to an agency representative at the dinner.

EMERGENCY BROADBAND BENEFIT

WHAT IS IT?

The Emergency Broadband Benefit is a temporary FCC program to help households struggling to afford internet service during the pandemic.

The benefit provides:

- Up to \$50/month discount for broadband services;
- Up to \$75/month discount for households on qualifying Tribal lands; and
- A one-time discount of up to \$100 for a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet purchased through a participating provider.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

A household is eligible if one member of the household:

- Has an income that is at or below 135% of the Federal Poverty Guide lines or participates in certain government assistance programs;
- Receives benefits under the free and reduced-price school lunch or breakfast program;
- Received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year;
- Experienced a substantial loss of income due to job loss or furlough since February 29, 2020; or
- Meets the eligibility criteria for a participating provider's existing low-income or COVID-19 program.

Wells College to Require COVID-19 Vaccination for All Students and Employees

All members of the campus community must be fully immunized by August 15, in preparation for the fall 2021 semester.

AURORA, N.Y. (June 10, 2021)—Wells College announced today that it will require all students and employees to be fully vaccinated against COVID-19 in time for the fall 2021 semester, which the College is planning to conduct fully in person. All members of the campus community are advised to receive their second dose of the Pfizer or Moderna vaccine (or the single-dose Johnson & Johnson vaccine) by no later than August 1, so that individuals will have full immunity by August 15, just prior to the start of the fall semester.

In a statement sent to all Wells students today, President Gibralter wrote: "I strongly believe that, as a residential college, the only path for Wells to return to normalcy is through the herd immunity provided through vaccination efforts." He added that the health and safety of everyone on campus, as well as our local Aurora community, continues to be our top priority.

The College made this decision in part because the U.S. Centers for Disease Control (CDC), the American College Health Association, and other federal, state and county authorities have all strongly urged widespread vaccination as the most effective and efficient way to reduce the risk of coronavirus transmission — especially in the type of congregate living environments that are found on college campuses. As per federal and state regulations, exemptions will be allowed for religious beliefs or medical reasons. The College is also creating this requirement with the expectation that the vaccines will receive full FDA approval before the fall semester begins.

"We were more successful than most colleges and universities in preventing the coronavirus from becoming widespread on campus during this past year," President Gibralter added. "That said, Wells College is designed primarily as a residential, in-person learning community, and we know that the only way we will be able to safely resume all aspects of that experience is through widespread vaccination efforts."


