Happy Anniversary to the King Ferry Food Pantry!

The King Ferry Food Pantry celebrates two anniversaries this year – it's the 25th year the pantry has been in operation, and it's the five-year anniversary of being an independent 501c3 nonprofit organization. In its recent five-year history, King Ferry Food Pantry Inc. has had 7,941 household visits, providing food for 480,921 meals to needy families and individuals in the Southern Cayuga School District.

For the 70+ dedicated volunteers of the pantry, serving the community is all in a day's work. Although our volunteers say it is rewarding just to be able to help others, the Volunteer Care Committee commemorated this anniversary by rewarding pantry volunteers (who take the cake!) with special cupcake treats (donated by Erin Krause Tones) on the first weekend in August.

The food pantry started with the Catholic parishes in southern Cayuga County in 1996, as a seasonal ministry for migrant farmworkers. For the first few years the pantry teamed with other area churches and agencies to provide food and necessities for the farmworker community. In 1999, the pantry became a member program of the Food Bank of CNY and was eligible to receive HPNAP (Hunger Prevention and Nutrition Program) foods and funding. In those early years the pantry tagged on with larger pantries to have cases of food delivered to Auburn for pickup by volunteers. In 2009 the pantry became aware of a greater community need and opened a walk-in site at Our Lady of the Lake parish house in King Ferry, serving 15 households (55 individuals) on opening day. In August of 2016 the pantry outgrew the model of fiscal sponsorship by Good Shepherd Catholic Community and left the nest to establish their own best practices, ensure financial sustainability, and take full responsibility for their organization. Fast forward to year 2020—the pantry had 1,743 household visits which represented 5,078 individuals. The volume of food ordered from the Food Bank these days comes via refrigerated trucks direct to the food pantry twice per month, with pallets stacked high and an average order weighing two tons.

Executive Director Debbie Patrick has been working at the pantry since it began. She says pantry volunteers all share a culture of “service” and consider those who come to the pantry as “neighbors in need.” Patrick said the pantry has provided a safety net for struggling individuals over the past 25 years because of the generous support it has received from the community. The King Ferry Food Pantry helps to supplement clients' budgets by offering

food to prepare meals for a week. They offer a wide variety of items: canned vegetables and fruits, cereals and grains, frozen meats/proteins, fresh dairy, bread, fresh produce, and personal care items.

The food pantry is located in the Ag Wing of Southern Cayuga High School and is open for drive-through service on the first and third Saturday mornings of each month from 9 a.m. to noon, no appointment is necessary. First-time guests are asked to bring identification and proof of address in the Southern Cayuga School District. Clients select the foods their families need by using an order form and volunteers fill the orders and load them into clients' vehicles.

Everyone is welcome to receive and to give. The pantry mission is "to provide access to healthy food and resources for our neighbors in need."






- Participants check out a sketchbook for one week and fill it with animals (however many pages they want and in any style).




New Roadside Storefront for Delaney's Aromatherapy



EMERGENCY BROADBAND BENEFIT

WHAT IS IT?

The Emergency Broadband Benefit is a temporary FCC program to help households struggling to afford internet service during the pandemic.

The benefit provides:

- Up to \$50/month discount for broadband services;
- Up to \$75/month discount for households on qualifying Tribal lands; and
- A one-time discount of up to \$100 for a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet purchased through a participating provider.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

A household is eligible if one member of the household:

- Has an income that is at or below 135% of the Federal Poverty Guide lines or participates in certain government assistance programs;
- Receives benefits under the free and reduced-price school lunch or breakfast program;
- Received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year;
- Experienced a substantial loss of income due to job loss or furlough since February 29, 2020; or
- Meets the eligibility criteria for a participating provider's existing low-income or COVID-19 program.

September 13, “How Can We Partner with the Rest of Nature?”

Kristin Ohlson, author, *The Soil Will Save Us: How Scientists, Farmers and Foodies Are Healing the Soil to Save the Planet*

Most people think plants are rooted in the soil mainly for stability and to siphon up water. Instead, plant roots are surrounded by microorganisms – fungi, bacteria, and many others – all furiously engaged in a dynamic partnership with plants and each other in which they trade carbon, nutrients, water, protective chemicals, and more. Without those partnerships, plants weaken and falter. Partnerships like these are at the heart of nature. They go on inside us humans—our microbiome is like an orchestra of trillions, constantly working together to fine tune our health and function—and everywhere in the landscapes around us. How can we better appreciate those partnerships—and especially, work with them and not disrupt them—as we farm and garden?






