
2021 SOUTHERN CAYUGA Community Read

"All the Real Indians Died Off": And 20 Other Myths About Native Americans

Each year, the Southern Cayuga Community Read brings neighbors and friends together to discuss a book that has local relevance while exploring timeless themes related to justice, freedom, and equity. This year, we will be reading "All The Real Indians Died Off": And 20 Other Myths About Native Americans.

Due to COVID-19, the 2021 Community Read will consist of small discussion groups, not a central meeting at the school. We will be breaking up into groups of five participants and one moderator (either in-person or via Zoom) to share, reflect and discuss the book and how it relates to injustices we see or feel in our own community. We will follow COVID-19 safety protocols using masks and social distancing.



We will meet during the month of October. Times and locations will be determined once groups have been formed.

GROUPS WILL BE FORMED IN ONE OF TWO WAYS:

Existing Groups: Friends, neighbors, coworkers who would like to form a community read group. We will provide a moderator and meeting area or zoom link.

Individuals: We will create small groups based on your meeting preference (either in-person or via zoom) indicated when you register.

Statement from President Jonathan Gibralter On the Death of Former Wells President Frances Tarlton "Sissy" Farenthold

Monday, September 27, 2021

To the Campus Community:

I wanted to share the sad news that Frances Tarlton "Sissy" Farenthold, the 13th president of Wells College, passed away yesterday in Houston just six days shy of her 95th birthday.

Sissy was a monumental figure not just in the College's history but also in national politics. Descended from a long line of prominent legal advocates in Texas, she won a seat in the state's House of Representatives in 1968 — and became the only woman serving alongside 149 men in the legislature. Four years later, she again broke ground by being nominated for vice president by Gloria Steinem and others at the 1972 Democratic National Convention in Miami, Fla. Although she ultimately came in second, it cemented her reputation as one of the nation's most prominent feminists in politics and government.

Later, after two unsuccessful runs for Texas governor, she would head the National Women's Political Caucus from 1973 to 1975. Then, in 1976, she was recruited to move to upstate New York to become the first woman president of Wells, which had recently celebrated its centennial anniversary and was still a women's college at the time.

During her time as president, she co-founded the bipartisan <u>Public Leadership Education Network</u> (PLEN) in 1978 to encourage college-aged women to pursue a life of public service and leadership. To this day, more than four decades later, PLEN brings several hundred college students to Washington, D.C. each year to experience firsthand how public policy is shaped and implemented at the national level. In addition, the Frances Tarlton Farenthold Wing of the Schwartz Athletic Center was built during her tenure, and it bears her name to this day.

I shared the news of Sissy's passing last night with the trustees, and Renée Forgensi Minarik '80 had this to say:

"As a current Wells trustee serving more than four decades after the end of Sissy's tenure, I certainly appreciate and understand the gift she was to our beloved alma mater and her students. But as a student between 1976 and 1980, all I knew was that if you needed an internship, a guest speaker, an interview or a job connection, you visited Sissy in her unpretentious office in the Bellinzoni building. I never walked away empty-handed . . . President Sissy Farenthold unselfishly shared her experience, her connections and her wisdom with all of us."

After returning to Houston in 1980, Sissy would continue to serve as an advocate for a variety of progressive causes, including human rights, the anti-apartheid movement in South Africa and the environment. Sissy is survived by three children, including George Farenthold II, whose wife Lisa Marsh Ryerson '81, of course, also served as president of Wells College. The family is planning a private burial this week; a public, in-person memorial service is being planned to be held at the University of Texas law school at a later date, depending on public health conditions.

On behalf of the Board of Trustees and the entire community, I send my deepest sympathies to George and Lisa and their family as we remember a woman who was a trailblazer, an innovator, and an inspiration to women around the world.

Wells College's Center for Sustainability and the Environment offers its October 2021 calendar of planned events and activities. All events this Fall are free and open to the public. All talks will be held virtually via Zoom; films will be shown on-site.

The **Sustainability Perspectives** series—held on Mondays from 12:30-1:30 p.m. via Zoom—looks at a wide range of sustainability issues from varied viewpoints.

October 4, "Savings Seabirds-Lessons from Puffins about Sustainability"

Dr. Stephen Kress, founder, Project Puffin, National Audubon Society

Worldwide, about one-third of all seabird species are now globally threatened because of effects of invasive predatory mammals, marine pollution, coastal development, and climate change. Against this grim background, Dr. Kress's presentation about restoration of Maine seabirds offers hope that people can bring seabirds back to some of their historic nesting places and responsibly manage essential forage fish which seabirds require. The methods used to bring puffins and terns back to Maine islands are now used worldwide and he will share a few of these exciting and hopeful restoration projects that demonstrate how individuals can make a difference locally for global biodiversity. Dr. Kress will also discuss insights about what puffins are telling us about creating sustainable oceans that benefit people and seabirds.

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



Cayuga County Historian Ruth Bradley will dig into cookbook collections as historical documents. In an article in The Citizen in 2019, Bradley says, "in many a cookbook collection, there's a grease-stained pamphlet on old mimeograph paper, bound with staples or yarn,



perhaps featuring hand-drawn illustrations: the community, or charity cookbook." Although "often considered flimsy ephemeral curiosities, let's think of them instead as cherished community heirlooms, because a closer look at these collections of favorite recipes reveals much about gender roles, food production, changing tastes, local organizations and even genealogical information."
