Sarah Heppner '05 is the Director of Policy and Research in the Federal Office of Rural Health Policy (FORHP), located in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. She has been with FORHP since 2012 and prior to becoming the PRD Director she served as Deputy Director of FORHP's Office for the Advancement of Telehealth. Her professional interests include using health services research to understand the impact of policies on access to care in rural communities and rural health disparities. She holds a Master of Science in Clinical and Translational Sciences from the University of Vermont and received her degree in Chemistry from Wells.

Sue Trainor '85 has been a nurse for over 30 years, working since 2010 as nurse practitioner. She studied Philosophy at Wells with the intention of working in retail in NYC after graduation but found her way into nursing through the ASN program at Tompkins Cortland Community College.
