WHAT WE DO

Scholarship program: K-6 education is provided in San Pedro, so we began by supporting students in 7th grade through HS with money for uniforms, supplies, and transportation. Fredis Argueta was the first child ever to attend high school in that community. As more education and student success became an example for others, we eventually were able to support students in university. 2021 was our first year to support seven students, all in university. The breadth and variety of majors, and the leadership shown by graduating and attending students has been so impressive! Beyond that, the students' response to the immense challenges posed by the COVID pandemic has been nothing short of spectacular.

Artisan project: This began with about 10 San Pedro families participating by crocheting purses in various styles and colors, or weaving big, beautiful hammocks. We pay them a fair price for their work and only add shipping costs and tax for the consumers. Getting shipments these past 2 years has been difficult with the travel restrictions, but we have managed with the help of the wider sister community network.

Equal Exchange Sales: As a way to keep the San Pedro project in the public eye, and to supplement donations, we began selling fair trade food items from *Equal Exchange* at Aurora farmers markets, the Friends Meeting House, and craft fairs as we are able. While this provides a small portion of our income, it takes much time and effort, and we welcome anyone who is willing to chip in some time on a Saturday or Tuesday!

Annual Trip: A part of this project that means the most to people in both our communities is the annual trip. We are welcomed with open arms and become part of their families for a few days a year, as well as meeting with the various committees to listen and set new directions for our relationship. We dance, sing, worship with them in their lay Catholicism, and eat simple, delicious food. When not in the San Pedro community, we tour interesting or beautiful parts of El Salvador or hear from experts on important issues – all under the watchful guidance and accompaniment of the folks at FUNDAHMER, a Salvadoran NGO, who also provide an interpreter. As the pandemic hopefully draws to a close, some of us are anxious to return soon and look forward to new conversations. We welcome fellow travelers, new and returning.

Our Mission Statement:

San Pedro Sister Community, Inc. works together with selected communities in El Salvador (e.g., San Pedro) to financially facilitate their goals for long term community improvement, and to provide regular contact and accompaniment through visits that promote bonds of knowledge, friendship, and strength. In addition, we strive to educate people of the Finger Lakes region of New York State in Central American issues and culture and about the joys and challenges of life in contemporary El Salvador through outreach, travel opportunities to El Salvador, and invitation for involvement in the San Pedro Sister Community.

April 11 Merlin, eBird, and the power of the birding community

Cullen Hanks, project team leader, MacCaulay Library, Cornell Lab of Ornithology
The Merlin Bird ID app is a stand-alone app built by the Cornell Lab of O to help people identify






