Finger Lakes' Protection Groups Raise Awareness for Resiliency of Watersheds

Lake Friendly Living Coalition of FLX offers 2nd Annual
Lake Friendly Living for Watershed Resiliency education series

Geneva, NY, April 19, 2022—The Lake Friendly Living Coalition of the Finger Lakes is pleased to announce the 2nd Annual Lake Friendly Living Awareness Month, this year highlighting watershed resiliency. In May, the educational series will host sessions virtually and in-person featuring over 15 expert speakers on the theme of watershed resilience.

With the common mission to protect water quality, this collaborative effort by nine Finger Lakes will educate and engage watershed residents, local governments, and businesses to adopt practices that will help protect and preserve our lakes for sustainable water quality, recreational use, and tourism. The month of events will include topics such as climate resiliency, home, garden, and shoreline practices, rain gardens and rain barrel workshops, invasive species threats, citizen science, and more.

“As a rapidly changing environment increases threats to our waters, working together throughout the Finger Lakes to empower our communities to better protect our natural resources through resiliency is imperative,” said Margie Creamer, President of the Finger Lakes Regional Watershed Alliance (FLRWA). “We at the Alliance are a proud supporter of the Lake Friendly Living initiative and are looking forward to some exceptional educational opportunities being offered throughout May.”

This year’s keynote speaker for the education series will be Fred Stoss of the University of Buffalo, on consequences and solutions for the Finger Lakes basin as it relates to climate change, and will be held on May 2, 7:00 p.m. All sessions are open to the public with pre-registration. 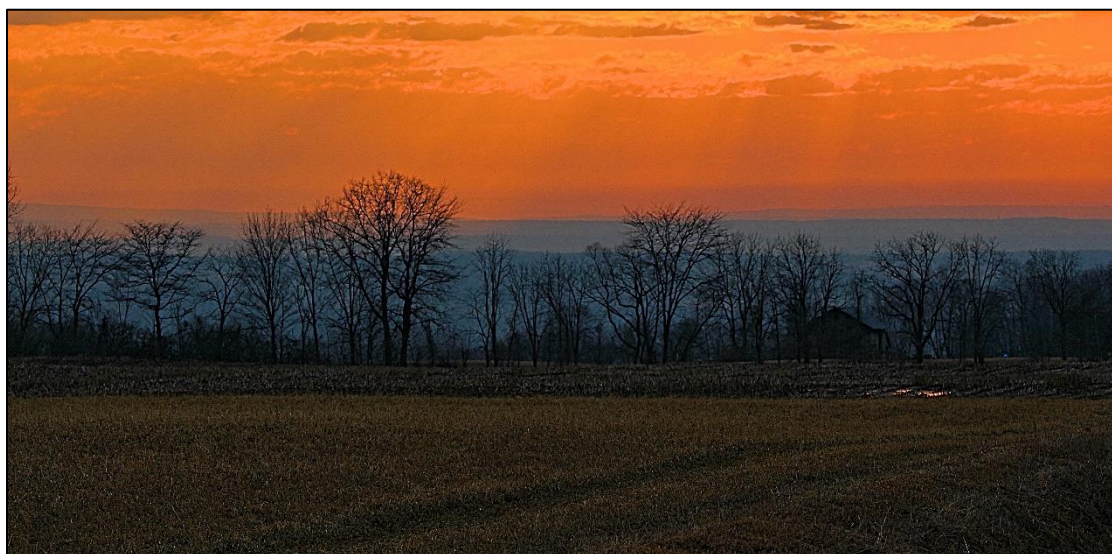

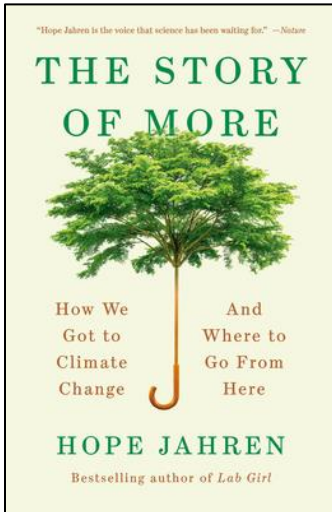

Celebration of Life for Cynthia Garrett

A Celebration of Life will be held for Dr. Cynthia Garrett, a beloved Wells College Professor of English, followed by a reception in the Faculty Parlors.

Cynthia joined the Wells community in August of 1993 as an Assistant Professor of English. She was promoted to Associate Professor in 1999 and to Full Professor in 2005. During her time at Wells, Dr. Garrett was instrumental in creating the first-year writing seminar, developing training materials, and delivering faculty workshops for those teaching the course.

From 1997-2002, Dr. Garrett was appointed National Endowment for the Humanities Preceptor in writing. She served on virtually all faculty committees. Cynthia was honored in 2000 with the Excellence in Teaching Award and in 2009 for Excellence in Academic Advising. From 2010-2015, she was appointed the John D. Wilson Presidential Professor.

Dr. Garrett officially retired from the College in December 2016.

Chuck Lamb's history is extensive, he has been with the Brubeck Brothers Quartet for 20 years and has performed with the Brubeck Brothers and his own groups internationally at major festivals and concerts across the globe. He has shared the stage with musical legends such as Ray Charles, Pat Metheny, Freddie Hubbard, and McCoy Tyner.

More recently, Chuck has released a number of highly acclaimed CDs and has played with many renowned artists, including Dave Brubeck, Bela Fleck, the Woody Herman Orchestra, Ernestine Anderson, Eddie Daniels, Dave, Dave Holland, *Cream* drummer Ginger Baker ... and principal members of the Philadelphia Orchestra, Detroit Symphony, and Albany Symphony. He is also a professional touring musician and prolific composer.

Peter Mack's accomplishments begin from his days as a classical student on viola, through his college years at Berklee College of Music in 1974. He cut his teeth on string bass at Syracuse's famed CASA DI LISA and was fortunate to play with passing through musicians the likes of Sal Nistico, Art Blakey, Walt Weiskopf, and Joe DiOrio, to name a few.

Forming his own group, the *MACKATTACK* – a sextet with 3 horns out front – in the 90s, he met and performed with drummer Danny D'Imperio. He then went on to play and record in Danny's group, the *The Blviators*. Musicians on the stand included Ralph Lalama and Gary Pribeck. In the past few years, he has teamed up with drummer Harvey Sorgen and performs with Chico Freeman and Chuck Lamb. Harvey Sorgen has been instrumental in introducing him to a new cast of musicians.
