King Ferry Food Pantry— Prepared to Relieve the Pressures of Rising Prices

Our mission at the King Ferry Food Pantry is to provide food when people fall on hard times, and you, our community donors and partners, are the strength behind the food pantry. Community generosity comes in many shapes and sizes, but it all directly translates into meals on tables of our neighbors in need.

The rising fuel and food prices are forcing some of our neighbors to drastically adjust their grocery purchases. Lowincome households with less flexibility in their budget to offset cost-of-living increases are quick to fall into hardship. Paying housing and utility bills often takes precedence before families

purchase food and personal care items. Recently a young mom in need for diapers for her infant was embarrassed to ask for them. Fortunately, we were able to respond to her request. Another mom expressed her concern that other families might need help more than she does but said she just couldn't make ends meet anymore.

In addition to putting pressure on low-income households, rising food prices also affect food pantry purchases. Like you, we are experiencing sticker shock at the grocery store. As a result of your support our shelves remain fully stocked. Clients consistently find a wide variety of choices to supplement their family need. Available items include canned and dry foods, fresh produce, dairy products, eggs, frozen meats/fish, bread/bakery goods and personal care products.

Access to nutritious food today creates the opportunity for all our neighbors to better focus on their daily responsibilities because they have the strength to do so. By alleviating the stress of having enough food, they can turn their energies to seeking employment, helping their children with homework, paying household expenses, buying medicine to manage illness, and maintaining their health. A good meal provides strength of body and spirit to a struggling individual. It enhances child performance in school.

The food pantry is fully aware of how fortunate we are to be part of a caring community that provides the resources, support, and encouragement to help our neighbors through tough times. We truly appreciate the money, food, and many hours of volunteer time that the community invests in this safety net for our neighbors in need!

Everyone in our community is welcome to give or receive. Those who need a helping hand will find a warm welcome at our pantry on first and third Saturdays of each month from 9-noon, or other days by appointment. 



About half of their 35 workers are from Mexico or Central America.

Achievements of Class of 2022 Celebrated during Wells College's 154th Commencement Ceremony

In her keynote address, alumna Deb Callahan '85 urged students to "never stop learning, and never stop giving the absolute best of yourself to what you love doing."

During Wells College's 154th Commencement ceremony on May 21, 2022, President Jonathan Gibralter conferred undergraduate degrees upon 59 graduating students. In addition, a longtime professor who is retiring this year was granted the honorary title of professor *emerit*, and several students were honored with academic and leadership awards (*see list below*).

Following that, the president paid tribute to two College leaders who are departing Wells this June: Charles Kenyon, dean of students, and Cindy J. Speaker, provost and dean of the College. During his tribute, he presented Dr. Speaker with a framed copy of a resolution passed in her honor by the Wells College Board of Trustees, which also recognized her as *Provost and Dean of the College Emerita*. "Ever since the day she arrived at Wells in 2006, Dr. Speaker has been a passionate advocate for our students and our faculty, a defender of the liberal arts, and deeply committed to the academy," President Gibralter said.

The day's events began at 10 a.m. in front of Macmillan Hall, with the traditional processional of students, faculty, trustees, and featured guests through the building's front doors. After the Rev. Barbara Blom '82 shared a spirited invocation, Marie Chapman Carroll '75, chair of the College's Board of Trustees, congratulated the seniors on their extraordinary achievement: "The pandemic changed the course of your college years, but you were flexible. You did not merely adapt to the changing environment, you met the challenges head on and that in itself is a capstone," Carroll said.

In his remarks, President Gibralter praised the graduates for their perseverance during a very difficult two years. "As you head out into the world, there are so many opportunities that your Wells education has prepared you for, as you continue to think critically, reason wisely and act humanely," said President Gibralter, noting that climate change, workforce disruptions and political upheaval are just some of the challenges their generation will face.

Student Commencement speaker Anthony Westmiller '22 — who graduated *magna cum laude* with distinction in his major (Biological Sciences: Health Sciences) — encouraged his classmates to take control of their destinies: "I like to say that our future is predestined, but that doesn't mean we can't control our own reality. Wells has allowed me to realize the importance of this adaptation and morphed my character into what you see standing before you," Westmiller said. "I am a first-generation student, I am a transfer student, I am a CSTEP scholar, I am an Organic Chemistry TA, and through no fault of my own, I am a Sagittarius. I came into Wells closed-minded and wanting to become a physician, but now I am leaving Wells to pursue a P.A. degree with a focus on holistic medicine," he added.

In her keynote address, Deb Callahan '85 said that, although she was not the most disciplined of students, she still made the most of her time at Wells by cultivating friendships that have lasted a lifetime. She also urged graduates to "endeavor to find work that you love — not what you think you should love. We lose time when we let others spend it for us, so find work that is worthy of your time and energy and aligned with your values, and not someone else's . . . never stop learning, and never stop giving the absolute best of yourself to what you love doing. *[See full bio below.]*

Following the keynote address, President Gibralter presented several academic and leadership awards to deserving students. He also granted *emerit* status to Vic Muñoz, who this month concluded a 28-year career as professor of psychology and gender studies at Wells.

Upon completion of the ceremony, graduates were invited to move the tassels on their caps from right to left, signifying the final step in their Wells College journey.


