A Letter from the King Ferry Food Pantry

As you read current comings and goings, or stories of the past, all give reflection on the small, vibrant, rural community of Southern Cayuga that we live in or are in some way connected. Whether you grew up locally or moved into the area, at some time you probably have volunteered for one

(or more) of the many nonprofit organizations that support needs in our community.

Have you ever considered the value of volunteering? When it comes to volunteering at the King Ferry Food Pantry, there are multiple answers to that question.

There is a value in knowing that every minute spent is making a meaningful contribution to our community by delivering a vital service to our neighbors in need. While volunteering, many feel value in a sense of purpose within the community or find value in being of service to others. At the food pantry these values can be experienced by unloading food deliveries, stocking shelves, filling orders for clients, or working behind the scenes – all with the goal of improving the lives of our neighbors.

The value of volunteering often cultivates friendships with likeminded people. The social aspects gained are extremely positive, along with an appreciation for not taking the basic need of food for granted. Each month volunteers ensure a generous supply of items from all five food groups is available to strengthen and lift-up those needing to supplement their grocery purchases. On first and third Saturdays mornings there are usually 24 volunteers working. And throughout the month there are tasks of picking up food, unloading the food deliveries, or prep work to be prepared for Saturday, all which requires another 24 volunteers.

When the word value comes to mind some may think about money. In April of 2022, Independent Sector released an article on the Value of Volunteer Time. According to the article, the national average monetary value of volunteering in 2021 was \$29.95 per hour. The operation at the King Ferry Food Pantry requires a minimum of 250 volunteer hours per month and that does not include meetings, administrative tasks, the Backpack program, or committee work. Using these numbers, the monetary value of the food pantry volunteers would be approximately \$7,500 per month! Just think, this is only one of the nonprofits in Southern Cayuga that is helping to build a stronger community.

It is interesting to learn through a study done by Fidelity Charitable that 66% of volunteers decreased the amount of time they volunteered or stopped entirely due to the pandemic. At the King Ferry Food Pantry, just the opposite occurred. Many caring people (especially Southern Cayuga School teachers) came forward when their employment was interrupted, to help their neighbors in need. This was such a gift during a time when we made frequent home deliveries to families in quarantine.

As you read through the articles in this newspaper, maybe a specific nonprofit captures your interest. Is now the time for you to think about volunteering? Whether the food pantry or another nonprofit appeals to you, you can make a meaningful contribution in our local community by volunteering. If you were asked the question, “Have you ever considered the value of volunteering?”, what would your answer be? Personally, I would say that the value of volunteering is **priceless**.

Those who need a helping hand will find a warm welcome at the King Ferry Food Pantry on first and third Saturdays of each month from 9-noon, or other days by appointment. We’re located in the Ag wing of Southern Cayuga High School, 2384 State Route 34B. 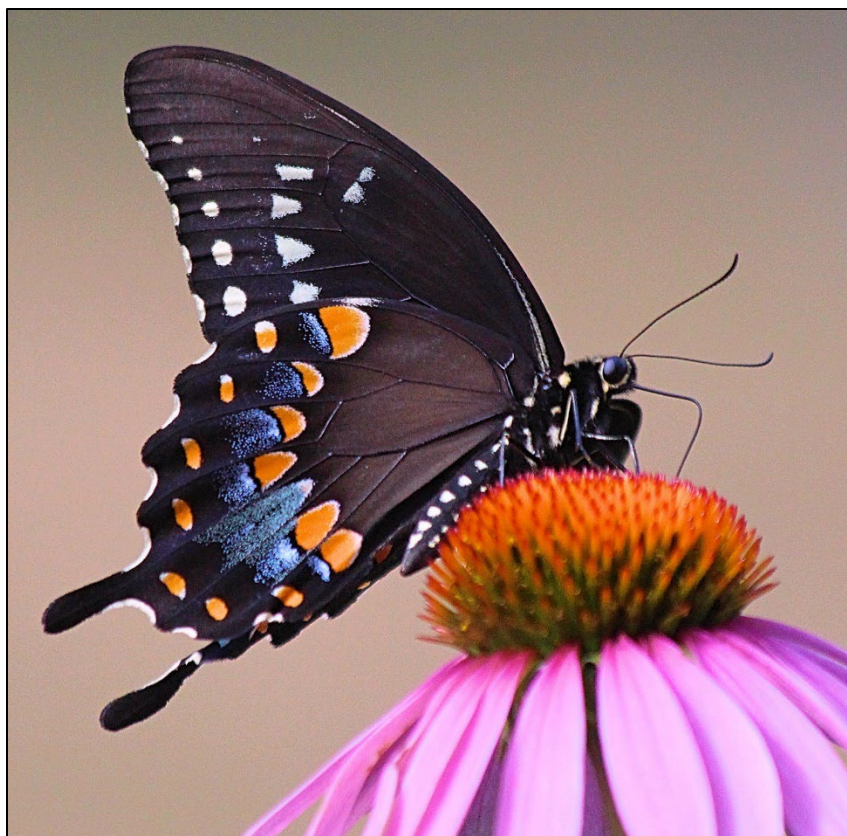

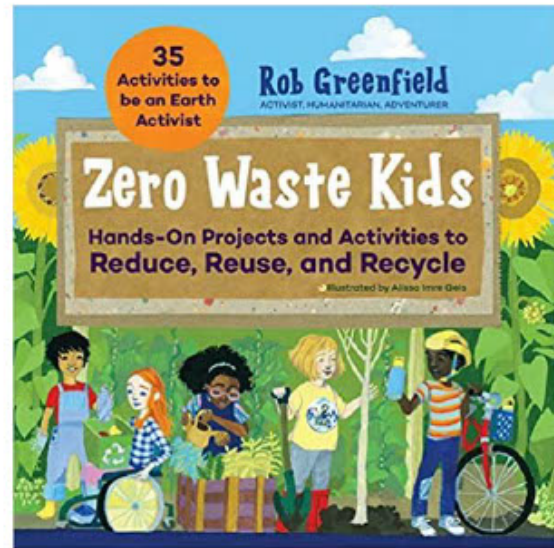

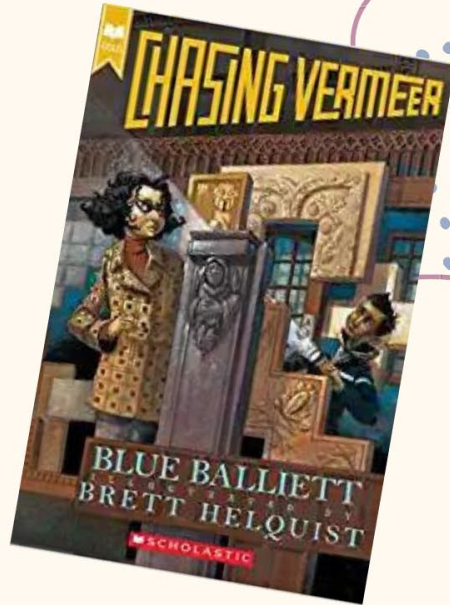
