



What's New at Patrick Tavern

Since opening to the public in October 2020, Patrick Tavern has hosted varied community events, most notably the Tuesday Mobile Market, available to the public weekly May through December and monthly January (or February) through April. This farmers' market offers vegetables, meats, and fruit in season by pre-order from local farms, as well as prepared meals. Many of these, as well as varied artisan offerings such as breads, bouquets, cards, crafts, and fair-trade goods, are also available for on-the-spot purchase.

But that's not all! The Children's Art Showcase has been an especially welcome part of the line-up since mid-July, and in late August the order coordination team of Matt Richards and Linda Schwab used some of the great market produce to put together a fermented corn relish.

Vendors and customers enjoyed a chance to socialize and talk recipes, and birds took care of cleaning up stray corn kernels (the table wipe-down was courtesy of Market Assistant Willow Marsh).



When Saturday, August 27 dawned a perfect crisp clear morning it seemed that AuroraFest 2022 would be a successful return of the village celebration last seen in 2015. And the day did not disappoint! Festive red and white tents festooned with photos from AuroraFests past graced the AA lawn. It had been carefully mowed by the crew from Wells Golf course run by Kevin Fitzgerald and Brian Dugan without whose support AuroraFest 2022 would never have happened. President Jonathan Gibralter and the Wells maintenance crew were also incredible partners. We are so grateful to Michael Peter, whose father was one of the AuroraFest founders, for his enthusiasm and for underwriting three marching bands for the parade. Thanks also go to the Aurora Fire Department for providing assistance, along with the Cayuga County Sheriff in keeping Route 90 clear for the parade (as well as assistance with selling beer without which no AuroraFest could succeed!)

And what a parade! 


