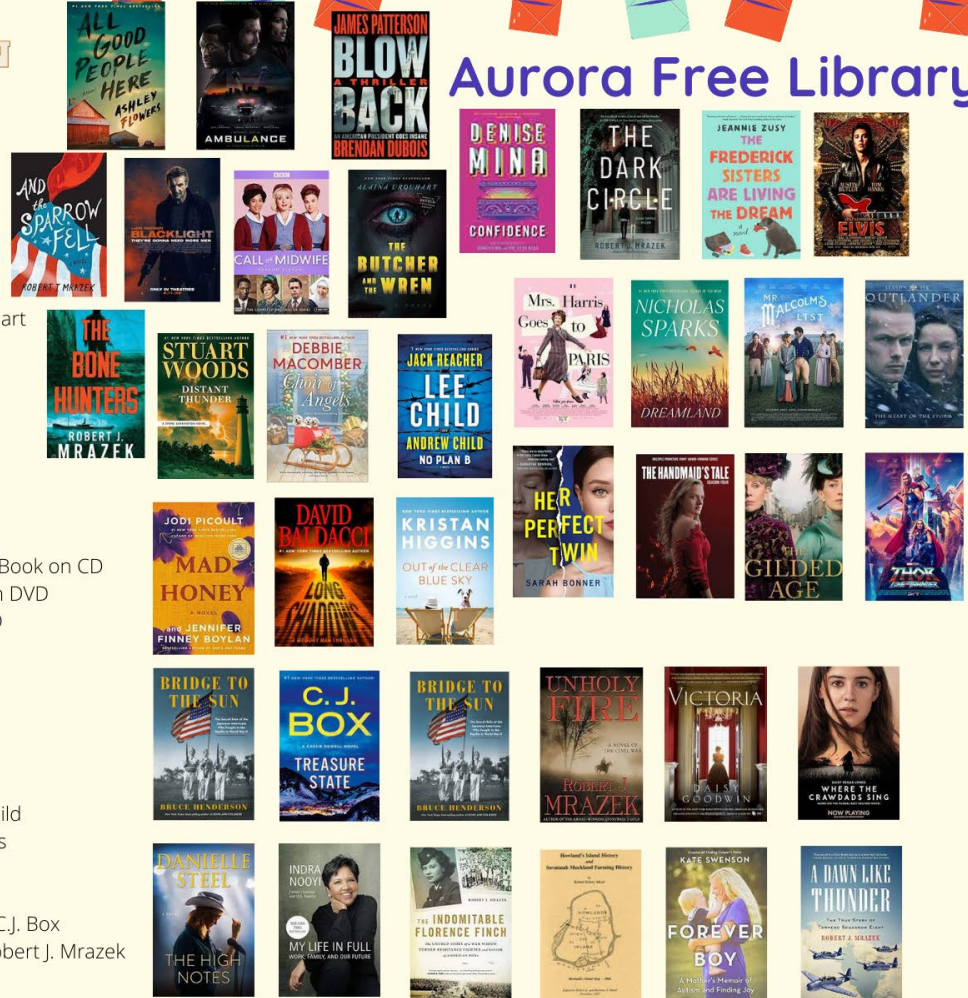

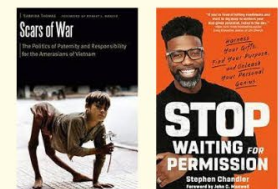

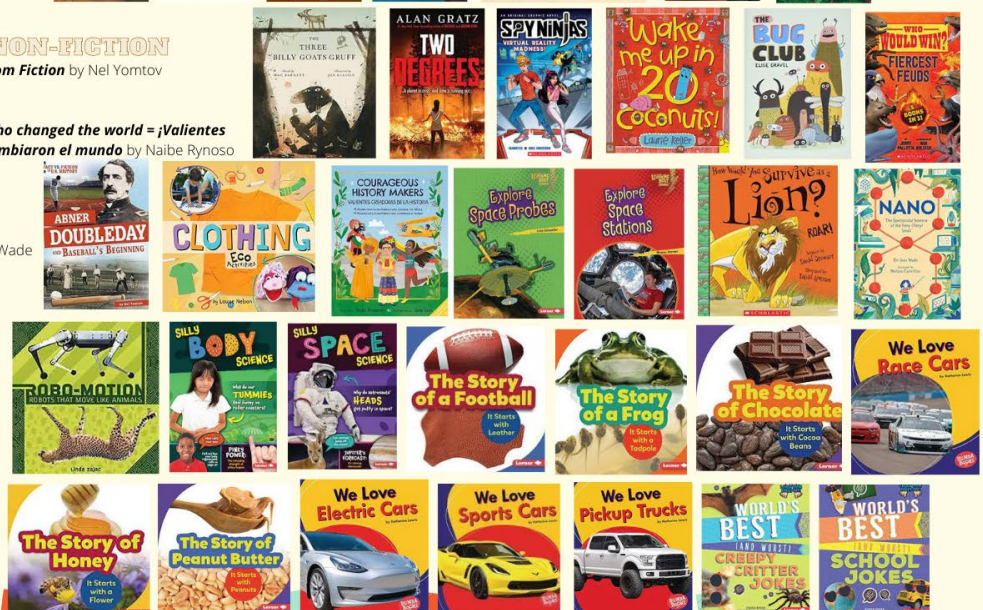

The original 1793 Dutch frame construction remains in full view in the lovely glow of sconces on the timbers.

Meanwhile, the Tuesday Farmers’ Market is meeting weekly in Patrick Tavern until Christmas, and once a month in the winter. This Mobile Market has become a mainstay for many local households. Right now, the focus is on pork, beef, baked goods, winter squash, potatoes, wheat berries, and dry beans, but garden crops are still coming on.

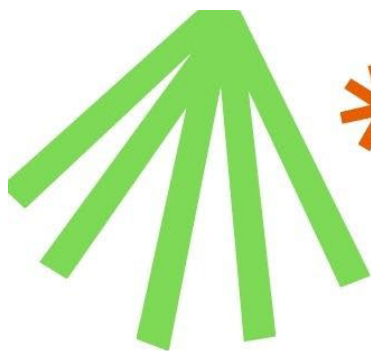
San Pedro Sister Community Travels to El Salvador Sunday, November 13 3 pm

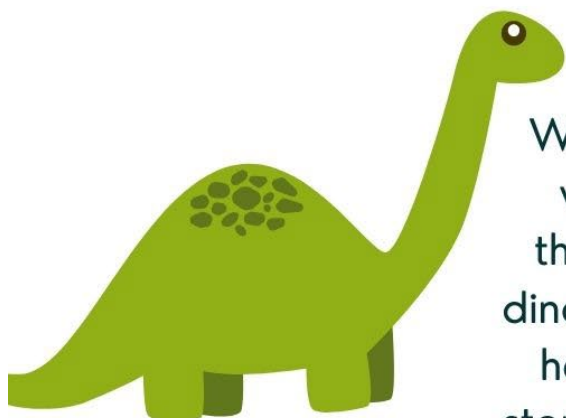

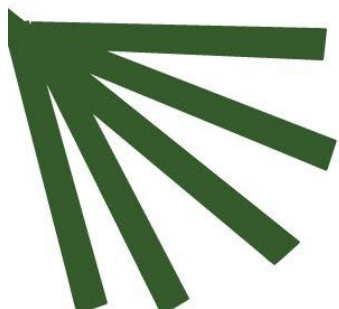
