

### February 13 *Enough is Enough - Building a Sustainable Economy in a World of Finite Resources*

**Rob Dietz**, program director, *Post Carbon Institute*

Nations around the world share a single unsustainable strategy when it comes to the economy: continuous growth. The pursuit of growth makes sense under some circumstances, but it has become dysfunctional, especially in high-consuming nations. With each passing day, we are witnessing more and more uneconomic growth—growth that costs more than it is worth. It's time to make a shift to a steady-state economy that can meet people's needs without undermining the life-support systems of the planet.

**Think Spring!** Starting February 1<sup>st</sup>, the *Wells College Seed Exchange* program is open for the 2023 season. All seed is available **for free** from our exchange and is available while supplies last. We have created an on-line seed supply inventory to review and an order form you can download and complete. The inventory list includes information for each item about the specific seed company donor if you wish to research particular seed varieties of possible interest.

Note that this inventory spreadsheet features separate tabs for the inventories of **Flowers**, **Herbs**, and **Vegetables** seed.

This inventory spreadsheet is "view" only - you cannot "reserve" seed. Orders will be filled in the order received (using the form below, please!) and the inventory updated as we fill orders. We will do our best to fill your order and if you provide email or phone/text information, we will communicate with you if substitutions are available (e.g. an organic variety is gone but we still have conventionally grown seed).

If you have a preference for seed from a specific company, please provide that information on the order form – we will do our best to accommodate your request.

**Please save your order form with a new name** - we suggest you include your name in order to prevent confusion. If you don't **rename your order form**, it will arrive to us blank.

Email your completed and saved order form to [seeds@wells.edu](mailto:seeds@wells.edu); we will fulfill orders as they are received and update the seed inventory accordingly.

We will safely and sanitarily pack your order and will advise when and where we will have your order available for curbside pick-up on campus. If necessary, we can mail orders but in order to keep our program costs manageable, onsite pickup is preferred.

Our 2023 Seed Exchange season opened with an inventory of well over a thousand packets of different varieties of vegetable, herb, and flower seeds. Seeds were generously donated by several different seed companies. Please note that due to COVID-related supply chain issues, several of the companies that generously supplied large quantities of excess seed in the past are unable to support our program this year. Due to this shortfall in supply, **we reserve the right to limit quantities** to ensure that as many patrons as possible are supported through our program.

All seeds in our exchange program are available **for free**. Please note that most seed offered is from earlier growing seasons (which is why companies donate it to us); we offer no warranties about germination rates although most seeds should grow just fine. We may still receive a few more seed shipments, so check back for updates to the *Seed Exchange* inventory. But don't delay – once the exchange opens, the seed stock disperses quickly.

## VOTES FOR WOMEN! READING & DISCUSSION GROUP

Sponsored by Humanities New York, the Howland Stone Store Museum will facilitate six sessions on the history of the Women's Suffrage movement in New York and the nation. We will utilize resources provided by Humanities NY and our own archives, interspersing material on Sherwood's important contributions to the Movement. The group will be facilitated by Linda Post Van Buskirk. HSSM docents and staff are encouraged to attend in preparation for the 2023 season.

The first session will be held at 4:00 p.m., Sunday, January 29, at Opendore. Zoom participation will also be offered to those who register in advance. In preparation, participants are asked to read Judith Wellman's book, *The Sherwood Equal Rights Historic District*, which is available for purchase from the Museum or on loan from area libraries.

From then on, we will meet every three weeks at the same time, or at a time mutually agreed upon. Subsequent books will be supplied on loan by Humanities New York. Book selections include history, biography, and fiction and consider African American suffragists and women of varied social standing.

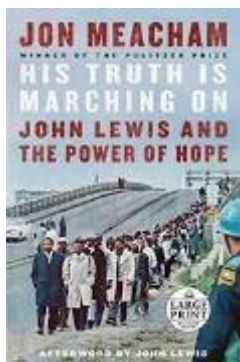

## *What Local Ecological Knowledge Tells Us about Ecological Change*

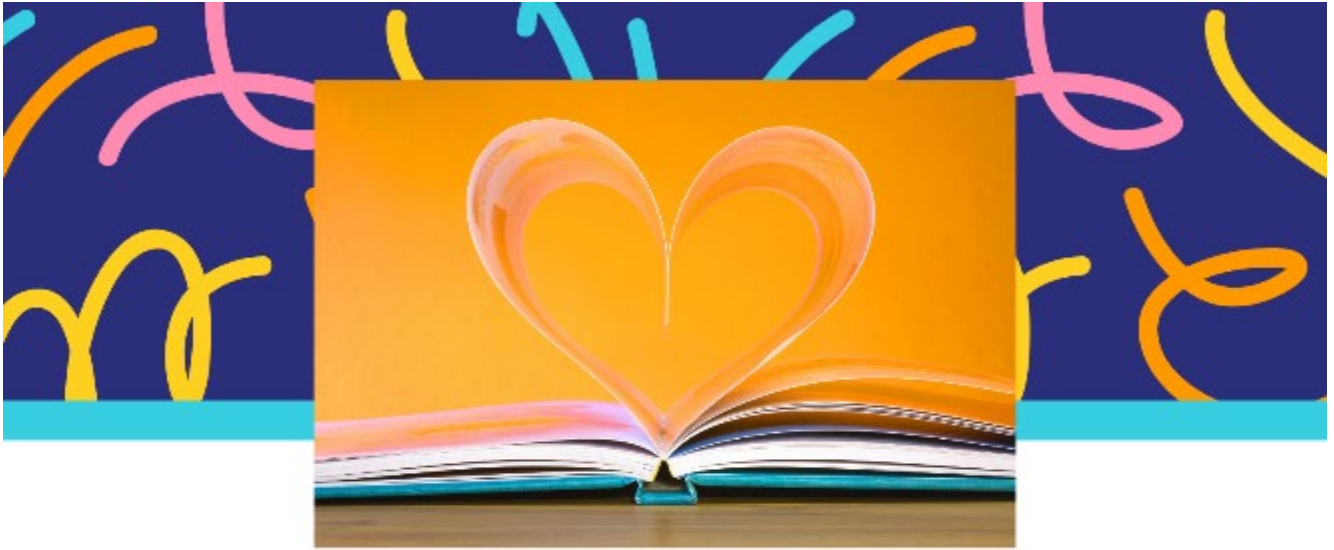

He strives to be a teaching innovator and the line between his teaching and research is sometimes quite fuzzy. He uses Ithaca College's living classrooms for classes such as *Environmental Sentinels*, *Farming the Forest*, *Tracking and the Art of Seeing*, and *Introduction to Herbalism*. In all of these courses, his goal is to help students build their own Local Ecological Knowledge System. To this end, he integrates natural history, nature awareness, academic ecology, medicinal plants, animal tracking, and wilderness living skills into his classes.

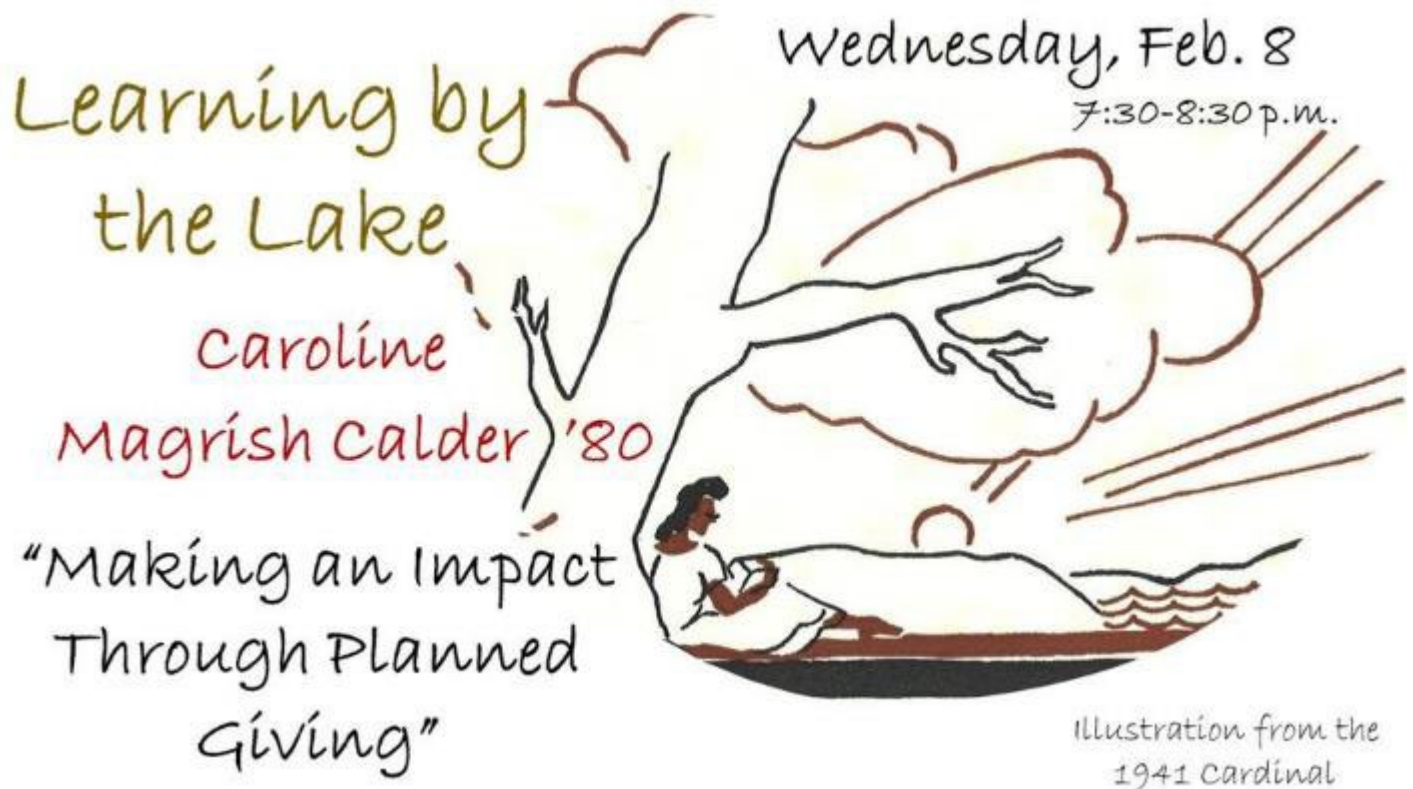
