Path Through History Weekend at Patrick Tavern

The next Patrick Tavern display, “Meet Benjamin Ledyard,” will open for New York State’s “Path Through History Weekend,” Oct. 7-8, noon to 5:00 p.m. The Aurora-Ledyard Museum Group (Patrick Tavern, The Howland Farm Museum, the Press of Robert LoMascolo, The Aurora Masonic Center, and the Town of Ledyard’s Historian’s Corner) is planning a number of special events that weekend.

Visitors to Patrick Tavern will “Meet Benjamin Ledyard,” the Revolutionary War officer for whom the Town of Ledyard was named, in a self-guided display. Ledyard was commissioned the land agent for the Military Tract in 1795. He mapped, and perhaps named, the Village of Aurora, which lies within the Town later named for him; his map included a sketch of Joshua Patrick’s tavern. Viewers will become acquainted not only with Benjamin Ledyard’s life, work and family, but also the enslaved members of his household who were foundational members of Aurora’s early African-American community, and some of his contemporaries and friends, including Aaron Burr. A schedule of interactive demonstrations (all ages) including basketweaving, leather working, floral art and more will be published soon.

In addition, Patrick Tavern is part of the “Fall Crawl Through Time,” a collaborative event including the Frontenac Museum, Opendore, and the Genoa Historical Society, with a “Passport” that enters participants in a drawing for a basket of history-related items from the four “Fall Crawl” museums.

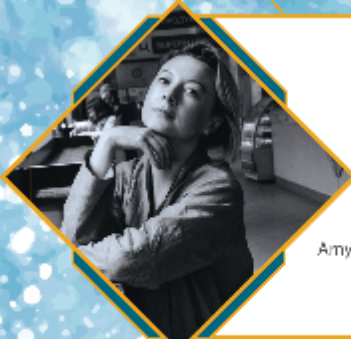

Le Haine (1995)

Released in the United States as *Hate*, *Le Haine* is a 1995 French social thriller, crime and drama film by Mathieu Kassovitz. Aimlessly passing their days in the concrete prisons of their dead-end suburbia, Vinz (Vincent Cassel), Hubert (Hubert Koundou), and Saïd (Saïd Taghmaoui)—a Jew, an African, and an Arab—give human faces to France's immigrant populations. A work of tough reality, *Le Haine* is a landmark of contemporary French cinema and a gripping reflection of its country's ongoing identity crisis. **Content Warning: Violence.**

Eight-year-old Ahmed has miraculously taken his friend Mohammed's notebook. He wants to return it, or else his friend will be expelled from school, so determinedly sets out to find Mohammed's home in the neighborhood slum. 
Book Lovers' Ball Book Club: Tom Wilber

The musical partnership between consummate performer Alasdair Fraser, “the Michael Jordan of Scottish fiddling,” and brilliant Californian cellist Natalie Haas, spans the full spectrum between intimate chamber music and ecstatic dance energy. Over the last 16 years of creating a buzz at festivals and concert halls across the world, they have truly set the standard for fiddle and cello in traditional music.

They continue to thrill audiences internationally with their virtuosic playing, their near-telepathic understanding, and the joyful spontaneity and sheer physical presence of their music.

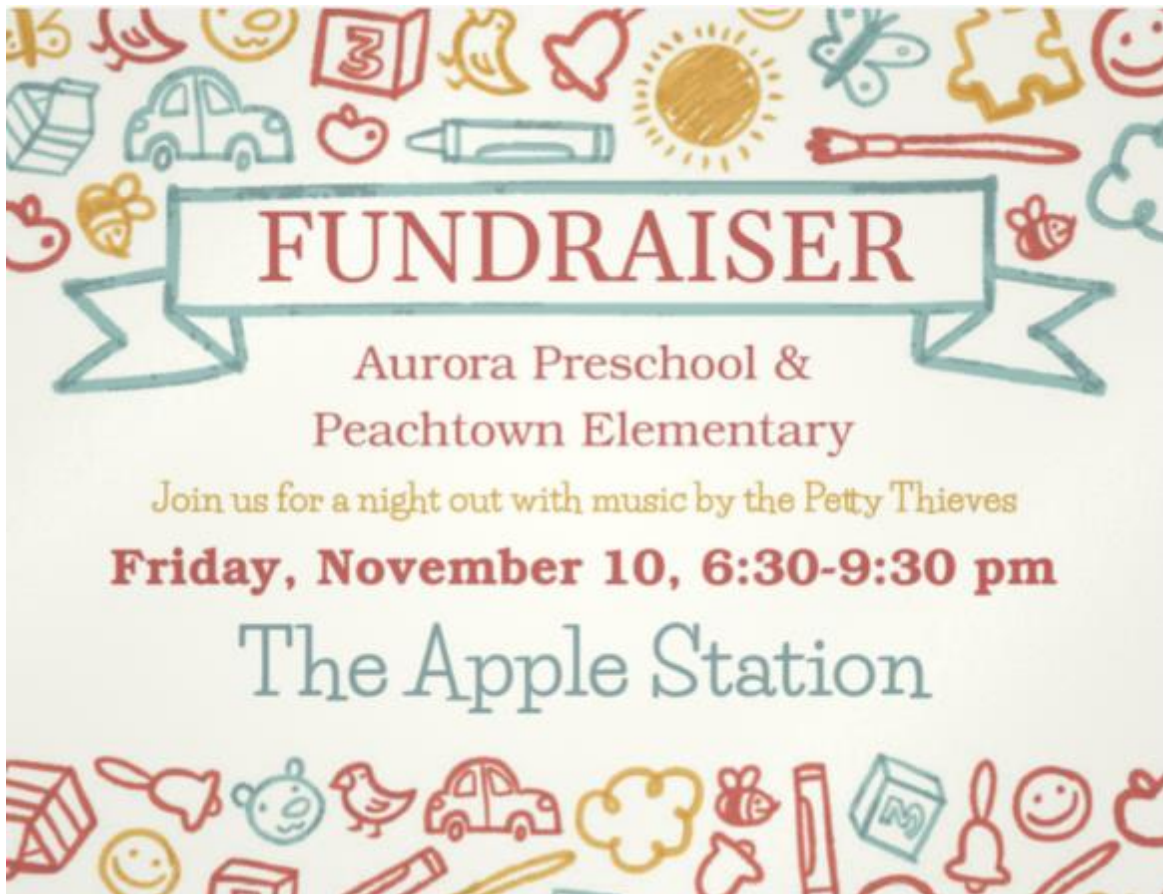
