#### **Dog Control Update**



New York State <u>requires</u> all dogs over four months of age to be licensed. Licensing ensures that all dogs have been properly vaccinated against rabies for the protection of both you and your neighbors. The license also makes it much easier to locate the owner of a lost dog when he or she is found. Any dog living with you for more than 30 days must be licensed. To obtain this license, owners must provide proof of current rabies vaccination as well as proof of the dog being spayed or neutered (only if applicable). This license must be obtained at the Town of Ledyard, and the license must also be renewed <u>each</u> year. Effective February 1, 2024 the license fee will be \$10 for all spayed/neutered dogs and \$20 for all intact dogs.

The mission of the Howland Stone Store Museum is to tell "the story of the Sherwood Equal Rights Historic District, a crucible for reform in the century following 1830." Historically, the Sherwood community was strongly Quaker, thus ardent believers in equal rights for all, including Native Americans. The Howland family and other Sherwood residents were leaders in the abolition of slavery, the Underground Railroad, women's suffrage, temperance, and education for all. The struggle for equal rights is an essential part of the mission of the Museum.

Native American and Colonial settlement history is still alive in this section of the State. Historical markers remind us that we are located on the historic lands of the Haudenosaunee. The Cayuga reservation was established just a mile or so to the west. The Clinton – Sullivan Campaign destroyed "Peachtown" where Aurora now stands. Present-day Cayuga, Seneca, Oneida, and Onondaga nations are close by, and arouse strong feelings among the non-indigenous population regarding issues of sovereignty, land claims, and reservation rights.

The program is designed to open a dialog on these issues, first educating members and friends of the Museum, then building relationships with local Native groups. Our goal is to understand the history of the conflict from differing perspectives, come to an appreciation of the "other," and discover ways to address historic injustices.

We have planned six discussion sessions on the assigned reading, one field trip to the Ganondagan State Historic Site, and one educational program session led by an educator from the Ganondagan Site.





# Electronics Recycling and Distributed Energy Production in the Circular Economy

Steve Figgatt
Founder and CEO
Sycamore International

At Sycamore, they leverage sustainable business practices as a competitive advantage and to increase value capture. A primary tenet of their company is embracing the concept of a



global circular economy, in which there is zero waste and all materials are reprocessed for reuse. Immense amounts of energy were invested in the production of electronics we all use. Preserving those assets and reusing those materials is more efficient and sustainable than mining and refining virgin materials. Steve will delve into this industry to explore solutions for responsible electronics recycling and some challenges the industry has faced. Sycamore applied their sustainable business philosophy to their electricity production, installing the first commercial solar microgrid coupled with an ESS Energy Warehouse Iron Flow battery on the planet. By pioneering the use of this system, they've made a viable business use case with a reasonable ROI for distributed energy production and long duration energy storage in industrial applications. These systems will help enable renewable energy to indeed serve as base load power as we decarbonize the grid across the United States. Steve will provide an overview of this system, the technology, the benefits over lithium batteries and general application for these systems.
