



Curtis Veiock, a resident of East Palestine, Ohio, holds the role of Regional Director for Growing Hope Globally, overseeing operations in Ohio, Pennsylvania, and along the East Coast while supporting the establishment of new initiatives.

In 1999, Growing Hope Globally, emerged when Ohio farmers Vernon and Carol Sloan rallied their community to tackle global hunger by shipping corn abroad. However, they soon realized the exorbitant costs and adverse impacts on local markets. Collaborating with organizations, they devised a different approach: using proceeds from domestic crop sales to finance international agricultural development. This initiative has since burgeoned into a network spanning over 20 states, supporting numerous Growing Projects and aiding more than 2 million individuals in cultivating sustainable solutions to hunger.
