

The goal is to establish an Indigenous college on the campus open to all students, Indigenous and non-Indigenous. Grand Venues will re-purpose some of the historic campus structures and develop senior housing in existing buildings.

Both organizations aim to partner with the village and surrounding area, maintaining the Community Medical Center and Peachtown School while preserving the historical integrity of the campus.

Les Lo Bough Jr, President of the HIIK, will visit on April 7 to share more about the HIIK vision and to answer questions. He now lives in California and welcomes the chance to visit CNY, where he spent a part of his youth.


