1,000 Orders Strong - Thank You!



Recently, the King Ferry Food Pantry reached a milestone - our 1,000th order placed through the Food Bank of Central New York's "Agency Express" online ordering platform, which has been in use for the past 10 years. Since 2015, over 1.2 million pounds of fresh produce, dairy, meats, and shelf-stable goods have come into southern Cayuga County - helping to nourish our neighbors and build a healthier community! We're proud to be part of a food bank system that goes above and beyond. The Food Bank of CNY is one of the few food banks in the country offering free, door-to-door delivery - and twice a month, a tractor trailer rolls into the King Ferry Food Pantry packed with food and hope.

Just this year, from January through May, 52,231 lbs. of food was delivered, and 13,478 lbs. was picked up by volunteers going to the food bank or meeting their retail food rescue truck. This is a combination of purchased items, donations, and USDA / NYS commodities. Total so far this year: 32+ tons of food have gone into the hands of those who need it most.

Every delivery day, our amazing volunteers are on hand - unwrapping pallets, stocking shelves, sorting frozen meats, and filling refrigerators with eggs, cheese, and yogurt. This work isn't easy, but it's filled with purpose - and powered by YOU, our community. This milestone wouldn't be possible without your ongoing support, donations, and dedication. Whether you've given your time, food, or funds - this is your success, too.

Walk, Talk & Learn at Salt Point

Presentation by Donna Scott

Saturday, June 7, 2024 10 - 11 a.m. (Rain Date: June 14, 10 a.m.)

Location: Salt Point Natural Area, Lansing, NY
Meet near the information kiosk at the north end of Salt Point

Description: Salt Point, in Lansing, is part of the delta formed by Salmon Creek. Now a spectacularly beautiful natural area, Salt Point has a fascinating history. Join Donna Scott to learn about the geological and human history, see what the local osprey family is doing, look for orioles, warblers and other birds, admire the native plantings project, and enjoy the expansive lakeshore. Consider bringing a lunch to enjoy lakeside after the tour.



Your Guide: Donna Scott is a Director of the Friends of Salt Point in Lansing and a life member of the Lansing Historical Association. Retired from Cornell University, she has many interests including the history of bicycle development, old houses, and salt production in Lansing and New York State. 




