#### Updates from the Howland Stone Store Museum and Opendore

It has been a busy month at Opendore with several programs and tours plus the completion and dedication of the Jeannette Rankin East Porch. Andrea Rankin spoke of Jeannette, educating the audience on her contributions to the suffragist movement, using her position as the first woman elected to Congress (House of Representatives) in 1916 to bolster support for the 19th amendment, giving women the right to vote. Being a lifelong pacifist, she voted against entry into WW I and WW II, as well as, at the age of 87, leading the Jeannette Rankin Brigade of 5000 women calling for an end to the VietNam war. She was truly a remarkable woman.

On June 28, a new exhibit opened celebrating the legacy of the Sherwood Equal Rights District. Curator Larry Bell will share stories from a small Quaker community that helped lead the fight for abolition, women's rights, and social reform. Step into Sherwood's legacy and experience the people and ideals that shaped a more just and equal America.

Upcoming on July 20 at 4 p.m., you are invited to attend a presentation by Beth Cuddy, 2022 School Librarian of the year by the NY Library Association and a collaborator with Ithaca College's non-profit media literacy program, Project Look Sharp. She will give us "Tips to Navigate Our Misinformation World." Her presentation will define and examine different types of misinformation and provide ways to combat it, an imperative skill in today's world.
