Caring for Our Neighbors: Food Pantry Delivers to Those in Need



The King Ferry Food Pantry is committed to making sure that no neighbor goes without access to nutritious food. Twice each month—on the first and third Saturday mornings—volunteers serve families through our drive-through pantry. But for those who are homebound or without transportation, the pantry goes a step further by providing home deliveries the very same days.

This important outreach ensures that seniors, individuals with health challenges, and families without reliable transportation can still receive the food they need. It's one way we put our mission of caring for our community into action.

For several years, volunteers Cathy Mullarney and Howard Nelson have faithfully led this effort, loading their vehicles with boxes and bags of food and personally delivering them to households across the area. Updates from the Howland Stone Store Museum and Opendore



Howland STONE STORE Museum

Future activities at the Howland Stone Store Museum are continuing with the planning of our winter Reading and Discussion Series. The mission statement of this series continues the theme of “tell the story of the Sherwood Equal Rights Historic District” and specifically this winter, to “See the events of the revolution through the eyes of New York settlers, women, African Americans, and Native Americans.” Books include:

~*Molly Beer's Angelica: For Love and Country in a Time of Revolution*~

On October 5 from 4-5 p.m. at Opendore, Sara Catterall will present on “Amelia Bloomer: Journalist, Suffragist, Anti-Fashion Icon.” Our knowledge of Amelia Bloomer will go beyond innovative dress in a lively and informative story addressing the challenges facing women in the 19th century and today.

On October 11-12, from 12-4 p.m. the annual FALL CRAWL, highlighting area historical museums will take place. Please take the afternoon and visit The Howland Stone Store Museum, the Frontenac Museum, and possibly the Genoa Historical Society and the Aurora-Patrick Tavern Historical Society.

On August 27-29, Larry Bell, the Howland Stone Store Museum historian, traveled to The University of Michigan's William L. Clements Library in Ann Arbor to assess and photograph the new Emily Howland archive, consisting of several boxes of material. This new Emily Howland archive became publicly available in 2024. It was purchased by the Clements Library from a private dealer who apparently gathered research material from Harriet May Mills, Florence Woolsey Hazzard, and Charles V. Groat. This was an excellent find and includes a letter from W. O. Duvall to Slocum Howland referencing the safe passage of a freedom seeker from Sherwood to Haiti Island, several Emily letters containing references to Harriet Tubman, and Emily's letter to Isabel the day after the suffrage vote was won.
