- If you are cleaning out your books, don't forget that we collect year round during library hours for **our July Book Sale**.

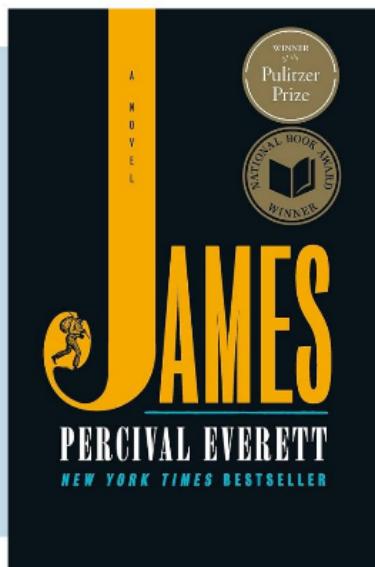

Birds who land in trees that are strengthened everyday by their incredible resistance to prevailing winds.

It can be rough out there in winter, but when one really loves nature and outdoor recreation, there is no "off" season. Winter is only temporarily harsh. I encourage us all to take time to appreciate this crisp, slow season, and to absorb winter's still beauty without which spring wouldn't feel so sweet!

I know I will continue to be out there, and I hope you will join me. Dress warm.



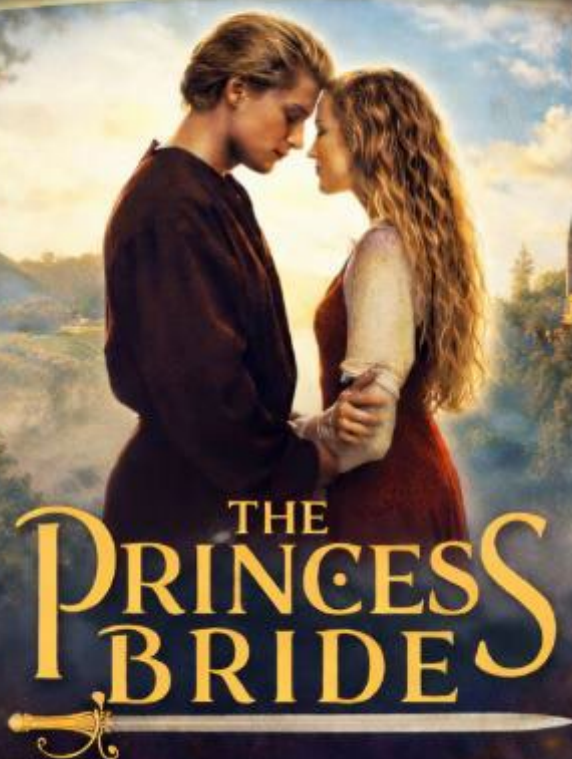

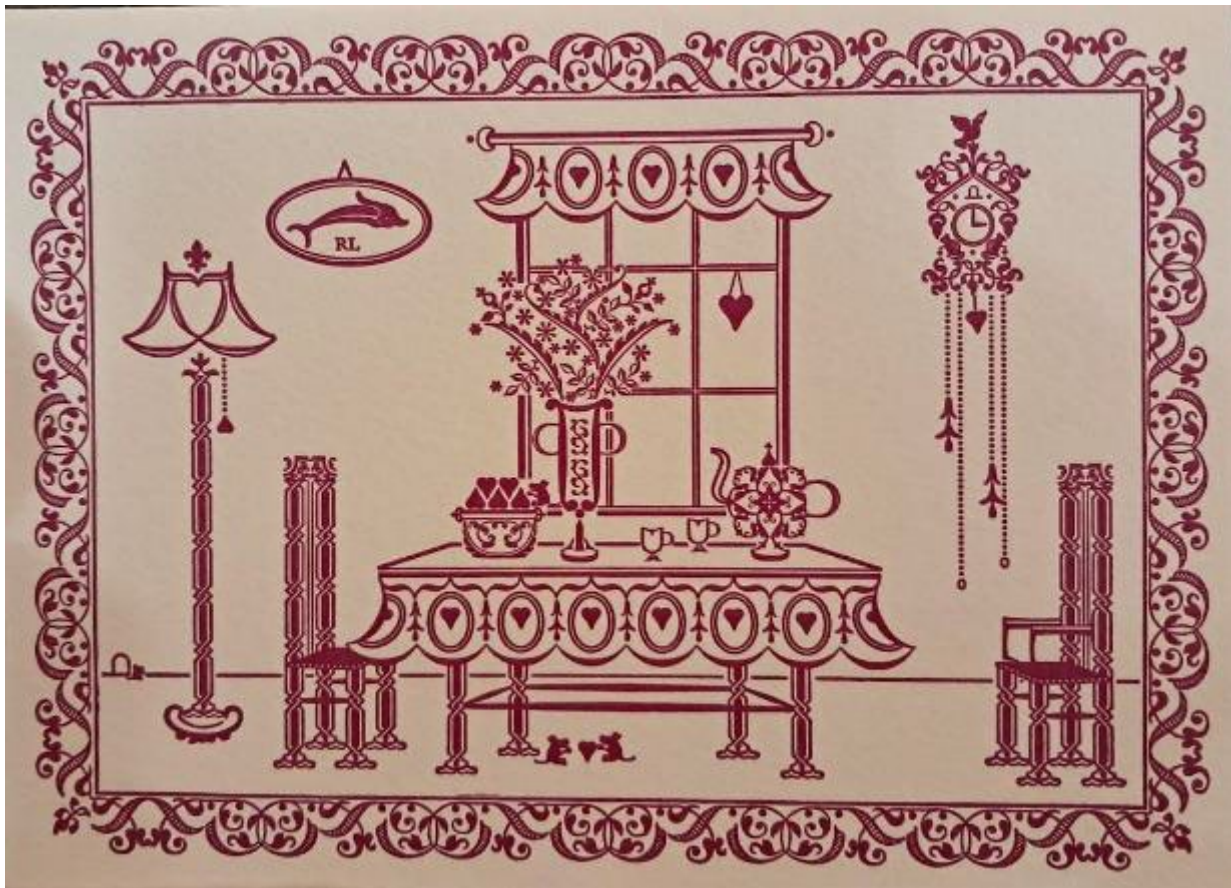
Patrick Tavern Market

Above all, the monthly winter market is a chance to beat cabin fever, do your shopping with warmth and convenience, and mingle with friends. See you then!



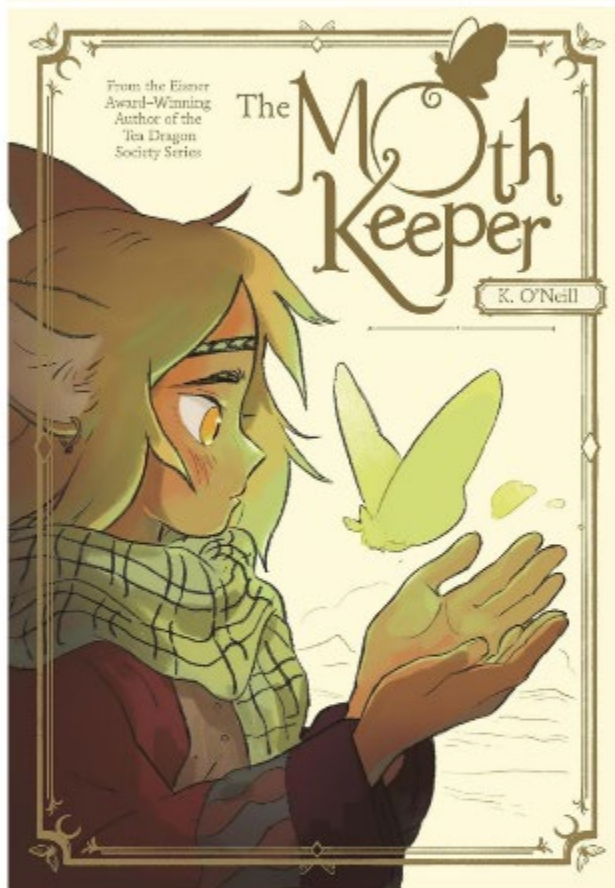

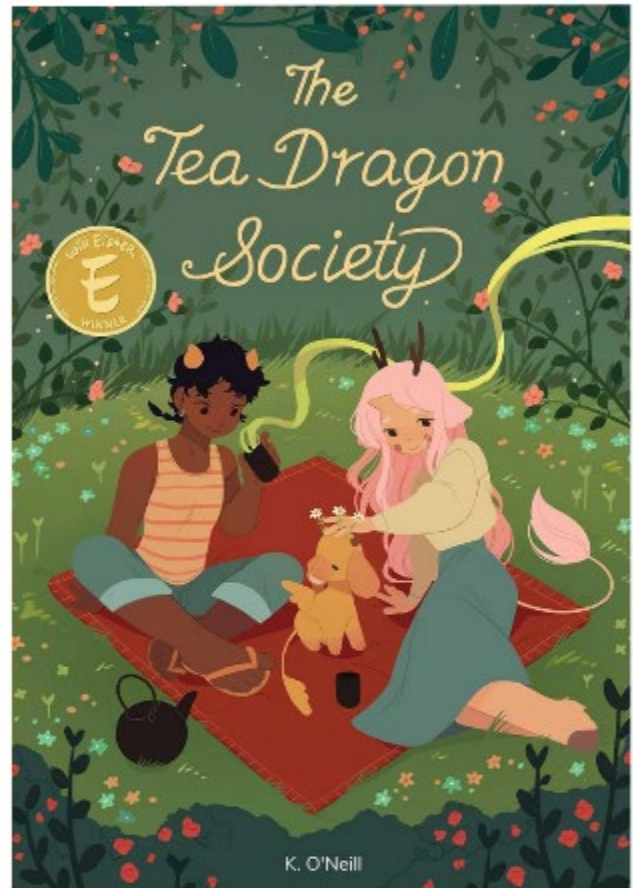
