One Weekend at a Time.*



For many students in Southern Cayuga, Friday can bring excitement for the weekend – but for some, it can also bring uncertainty about where their weekend meals will come from. That's why the King Ferry Food Pantry's **BackPack Food Program** is so important.

Students experiencing food insecurity are provided with nutritious, easy-to-prepare foods to take home for weekends and school breaks. The goal is simple: **help ensure students have enough food to eat** when school meals are not available.

In 2025–26, thanks to the generosity of community members and support from the **United Way of Cayuga County's Mini-Grant program**, we were able to help ensure students had enough food to eat last fall, especially when **SNAP benefits were temporarily paused**.



What goes into a BackPack?

Foods that are kid-friendly, nutritious and simple to prepare, such as:

- Microwave mac & cheese
- Shelf-stable milk
- Cereal
- Granola and protein bars
- Pudding cups
- Juice boxes
- PopTarts
- Fruit cups
- Tuna packets
- And other easy-to-prepare foods



Thanks to everyone who volunteers, donates food and funds, advocates, and helps pack and deliver these backpacks. **Together, we are showing our students that their community cares**—and that no one has to go hungry.

September starts with a wide range of summer vegetables and lots of herbs at the mother-daughter tables of Debi and Julia Lampman—plus, of course, gorgeous bouquets, including the new pastel zinnia, “Aurora.” Heirloom tomatoes are on the way!

Thane Benson’s Benlauck Farm is sending potatoes (red and white) as the month begins, and “Raquel” sweet corn. Fingers crossed for September apples from both Thane and the SHARE Farm (late freezes affected a lot of fruit).

Margaret Flowers’ Trinity Farm is supplying young, tender zucchini grown using organic methods.

Ron brings his own honey and bee products and a tasty assortment of fruit as the season progresses. Alicia brings sourdough, pizza crust and special breads, The San Pedro Sister Community keeps us stocked in chocolate, coffee and more. 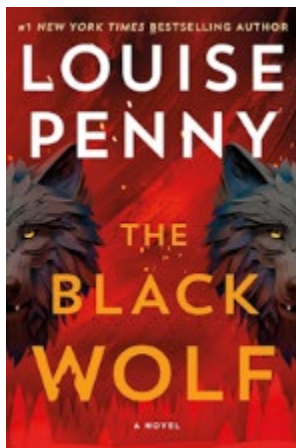

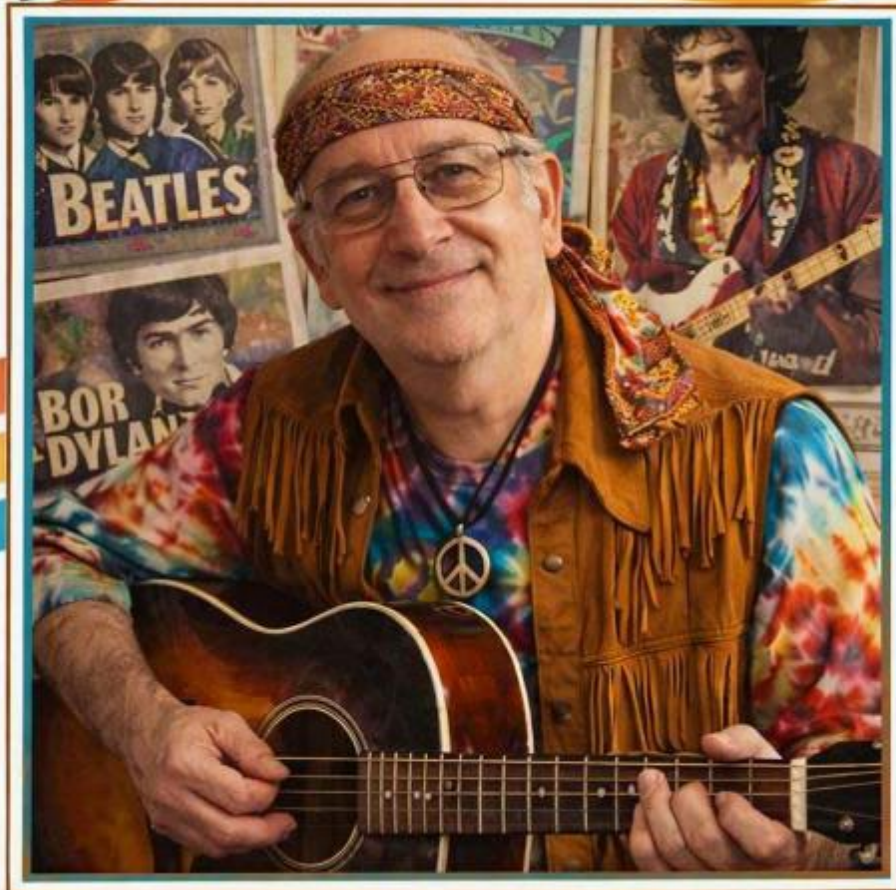

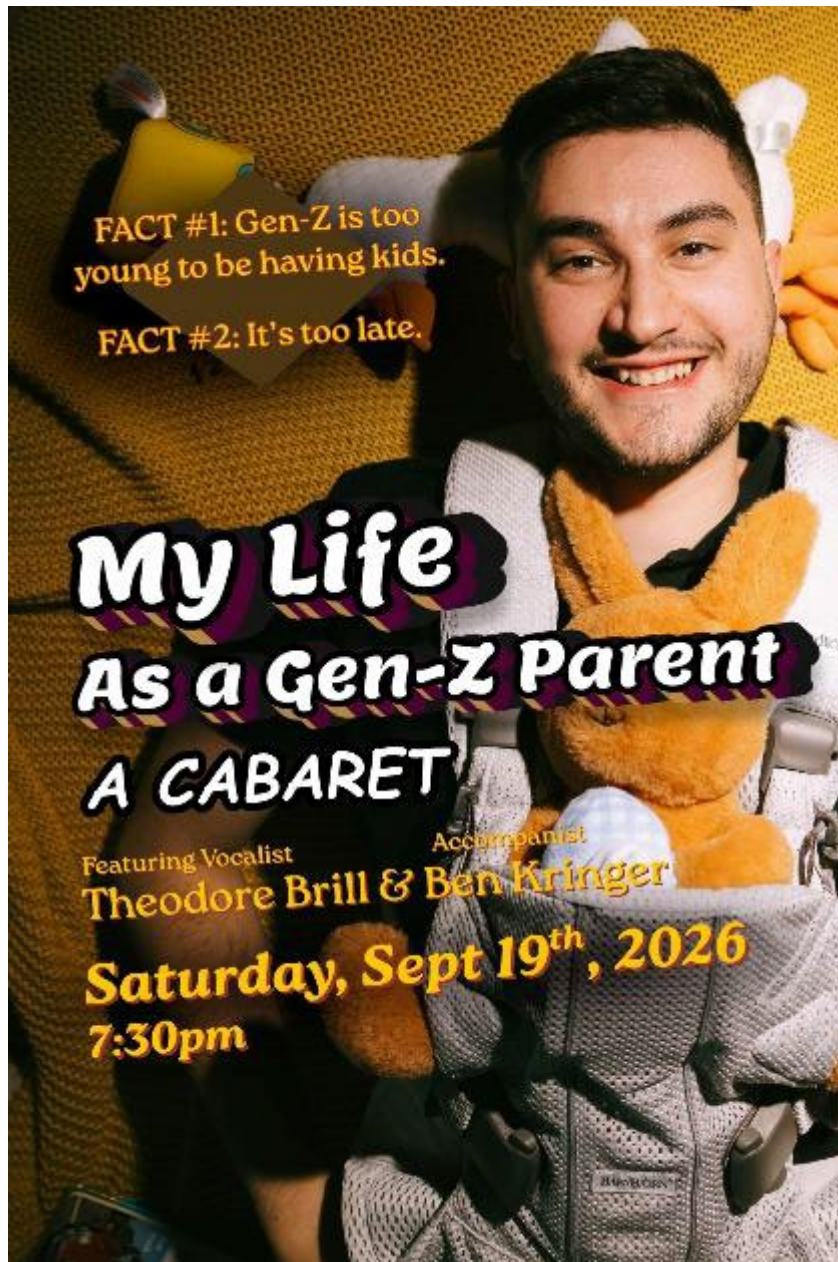
Songs of the ★ 60s and 70s ★

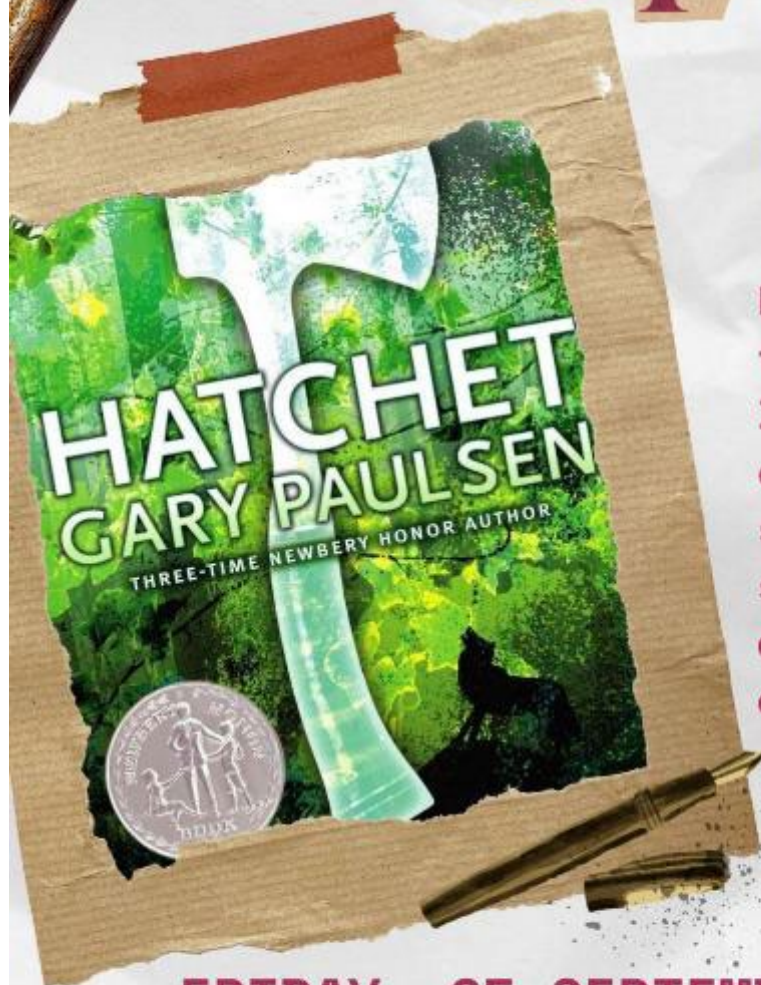
